Luncheon Speakers

WIEDERMANN-STEINER SYNDROME FOUNDATION

On March 7, Adam Macek was our guest speaker. Adam spoke with the club about a rare genetic disorder, Wiedermann-Steiner Syndrome (WSS), which affects his daughter, Mackenzie. Mackenzie is a six-yearold student at Sprina Brook Elementary School. Mackenzie was diagnosed when she was 18 months old. This happened after she started missing developmental milestones and her parents did genetic testing.

Mackenzie is cognitively at the level of a two-year-old. She understands

language and what people are saying, but she is nonverbal.

WSS is an extremely rare genetic disorder that was officially recognized for the first time in 2012. It affects the 11th chromosome and there are fewer than 1,000 cases worldwide. It is believed that there are many undiagnosed cases, as well, as the designation is so new.

WSS symptoms present on a spectrum and each case presents differently. Many have vision and hearing difficulties. Many are also nonverbal and suffer from musculoskeletal issues. The most common trait is behavioral issues. There is no known limit on life expectancy, as the oldest identified person with WSS is 51.

To date, research on WSS has been sparse because of its rarity. The little research that has been done has been funded by families of those with WSS. Currently, geneticists in Iceland are working on WSS with a grant from the WSS Foundation.

Adam is a regional ambassador for the foundation. He has become the point person for newly diagnosed families to help provide resources and support from the foundation.

PROJECT C.U.R.E.

Katie Hanlon was our guest speaker to talk with the club about Project C.U.R.E., the largest distributor of donated medical supplies and equipment to underserved hospitals in the world. Our club became acquainted with this organization when Lion Jim Woodring was attempting to donate our eye exam chair, which was formerly housed at the Ann Reid Center. Project C.U.R.E. accepted the donation.

Project C.U.R.E. started in Denver as a single garage of medical supplies and has grown to distribution centers in seven cities. They have donated supplies and equipment all over the world – 134 countries and over \$1 billion worth of donations.

When there is a need, a hospital reaches out to Project C.U.R.E. and a packing list and assessment is created. They work with a distribution center to fill a 40-foot shipping container with the supplies on the list. That container gets packed by volunteers and shipped to the hospital. Three months later, the organization sends a volunteer to assess the progress.

The volunteers leave no space unfilled in the shipping containers. Each costs approximately \$25,000 to ship, but contains \$500,000 in supplies. Volunteers are in the building almost every day. The closest warehouse is in Woodridge.

RIDE ASSIST NAPERVILLE

Ashley Abraham, executive director of Ride Assist Naperville, was our guest speaker on March 21. This organization provides transportation for seniors to attend medical appointments.

Each ride begins with the senior being picked up at home, driven to

their appointment where the driver waits, and then drives him/her home after it has finished. They do not turn anyone away based on ability to pay. There is a suggested donation of \$15.00 per roundtrip ride.

Right now, the service only covers medical appointments, but they are working on expanding to grocery store trips. They cannot transport for procedures involving anesthesia due to fall risks.

Any senior (60+) in Naperville is eligible for a ride. Rides must be reserved at least seven days in advance.

Both drivers and riders must apply to be a part of the program. Drivers use their own vehicles. They still wear masks for the ride and disinfect after each ride.

They currently serve 477 riders. They have 56 volunteer drivers (Lion Jim Woodring among them). They recently gave their 8,000th ride. Funding comes from the Naperville Social Services Grant.

The Board of Directors met at Beidelman-Kunsch Funeral Home in Naperville on March 28, 2023. The following is a summary of the Board's actions and discussions. Approved the Social Service Report for March 2023. Expenditures for the nine months totaled \$46,383.

Discussed the purchase of an iPhone 12 for District 203 to be used in their diabetes program. Allocated up to \$600 for the purchase of the phone only. The School District will be required to pay the monthly service charge. Funds will be allocated from the budget category "Priority 2 Diabetes."

Approved the membership of Jennifer Brown, pending receipt of her membership fee.

Discussed membership – Members dues are up-to-date. There are two possible new members from School District 203. Membership applications are expected in April.

Discussed flower sales. Sales are lagging behind last year; however, most money will come in the last week of the sale. The last date to turn in orders is April 4.

Discussed Sight and Sound Sweepstakes event. The event will continue until the middle of May. 13 tickets remain unsold.

Discussed highway clean up. Sign up is complete. The next cleanup date is April 15.

Discussed the Naperville all service club project. No real direction has been established as of this date. Possible September or October event date is being considered. More information will be provided at a later date.

Discussed NNLC service project. Lion Jane has met with Clarendon Hills Lions Club to obtain information. Project is in the preliminary stages. Looking for drop off location and possibility setting up QR code on website for donations. More information will be provided at a later date.
