PRE-K VISION SCREENING

During April, vision testing was provided for pre-kindergarten children at Ann Reid, Scott, and Maplebrook schools. A total of 82 children were seen, with 65 passed, 12 referred, and 5 unable to test.

Lions Jennifer Brown. Rob Bremner. Jim Ebers, Ellen Wolff, and Jim Woodring performed screening using the Plusoptix instrument. pre-school exams were formal provided by Lions Drs. Michael Russell, Katie Hertzberg Mathews, and Mark Rafferty. Low-income referrals will be seen by the doctors for a more thorough exam. School nurses and teachers provided essential help in organizing and coaching the children.

A big hit with the kids was the provision of yellow stickers: "My Vision was Checked by a Lion" and a small plushie lion. Several kids didn't have permission slips to be tested, but they were also provided lions so they did not feel left out. Leftover lions were given to Lion Ellen Wolff for the Comfort Toys for Kids project at Edward Hospital.

Luncheon Speakers

BRAIN INJURY ASSOCIATION OF ILLINOIS

Philicia Deckard was our guest speaker on April 4 to tell the club about the Brain Injury Association of Illinois, a statewide organization. Philicia is the executive director and grew up in a Lions family as her father was a Lion. She shared her memories of working at pancake breakfasts throughout her youth.

Philicia informed us that a brain injury occurs every nine seconds in the United States. There are 250,000 individuals living with brain injuries in Illinois. Brain injuries impact all aspects of a person's life.

The organization offers education, support, and community resources to individuals with brain injuries. They work with a wide range of injury severities and stages of recovery. They assist individuals in their transition back to the community and provide ongoing services following rehab.

The Brain Injury Association operates an 800 number for calls and texts to get information and resources. They also have an injury prevention program where they go into the school setting to show children ways to prevent brain injuries. They provide training for certified brain injury specialists and operate camps specifically suited for individuals with brain injuries.

NAPERVILLE WATER

On April 11, Amy Wrigley and Frank Selvaggi were our guest speakers from the Naperville Water Utility. Amy is a technical specialist and Frank is a collection and pumping field supervisor. They educated the club on what happens to waste and rainwater in the city.

Fundamentally, the city uses gravity as much as possible to direct water to pumping stations throughout the city. Once water reaches the pumping station, it is pumped out to

the water reclamation center. Each pumping station has two redundant pumps and many sensors for monitoring any issues. If there is an issue, the department is alerted quickly and able to troubleshoot.

The pumping stations are maintained throughout the year. They use a flush truck to clean out the pipes. They clean the entire system every five years.

They use cameras to check the inside of pipes. They also use smoke to look for leaks in the system.

The water reclamation center takes in all of the dirty water in the city and forces it through several steps to come out clean on the other end. One of those steps involves filtering out various items that were flushed but should not have been. This waste ends up being transported to the landfill.

EASTER SEALS OF DUPAGE AND FOX VALLEY

Max Wiersum and Michael Krupka were our guest speakers on April 18 to talk with the club about Easter Seals of DuPage and Fox Valley. Easter Seals was formed about 100 years ago to help children with special needs and developmental delays. Following World War II, the organization expanded to assist in the needs of veterans returning home. The local organization was formed in 1942 and is headquartered in Villa Park. The local focus is on pediatric therapy services.

The local organization has service sites in Naperville, Villa Park, and Elgin which provide services that are unmatched in the Chicagoland area. They devote a lot of energy to diagnostics. They attempt to look at the whole picture to find every issue a child may have so that care can be properly coordinated with multiple medical providers. This is done with their multi-disciplinary diagnosis evaluation in conjunction with the University of Chicago.

They run an audiology department which is open to all ages. They also offer nutrition and feeding clinics. Hearing loss and nutrition deficits are very common in children with autism and developmental delays.

They operate the Lily Garden child development center which is an inclusive program. Children with and without disabilities learn together in one environment where all staff are trained and prepared to handle disabilities.

Easter Seals partners with the state of Illinois' early intervention program available to all children under the age of three. They work with local health departments and offer services to these children who display a developmental delay.
