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People's Resource Center For 31 years, people in DuPage County have reached out to help each other through the People's Resource Center (PRC). Last year, because of their generosity, 19,216 people received help for today, food, clothing, and rent assistance, as well as hope for tomorrow, through literacy education, training, access to technology, and art enrichment. To all who sustain this center of help and hope, we are humbly grateful.

Marcia Shields from the Naperville Police
Department discussed safety programs in

School Districts 203 and 204. Programs start as early as pre-school. As many as 1,800 pre-schooler's attended Safety-town. Marcia discussed several programs such as:

On Your Own-Third Grade

"On Your Own" is a third grade latchkey program presented to approximately 2800 students in School District #203, School District #204 and all private schools in Naperville by a Crime Prevention Specialist. "On Your Own" is completed in one classroom period and consists of a power point presentation followed by discussion with the children on topics they need to be aware of when they are on their own at home. The students also receive a booklet to take home and share with their parents and discuss safety information. "On Your Own" helps students and parents to be sure the students are ready to be safe at home at those times when they do have to stay home alone.

Be Smart, Be Safe Fourth Grade

The "Be Smart, Be Safe" program is offered in School Districts 203, 204 and in the private schools in Naperville. This is a personal safety program presented in three school days and is instructed by a Crime Prevention Specialist and a Crime Prevention Officer or an Elementary School Resource Officer (ESRO).

The curriculum consists of the five basic safety rules, the definition of a stranger and role-playing with the students. During the course of the discussion, a stranger (who is actually one of the student's parents dressed in disguise) "steals" the officer's bag. The students then go on to describe the "stranger" so he can be apprehended. This activity teaches the students how to be good witnesses. The program also includes an Internet Safety component. Through the use of a Power Point program developed by Microsoft and the NPD, the students are provided safety rules regarding Internet usage, visiting chat rooms and the dangers of talking to "strangers" in the chat room. Approximately 4,200 students are served at 35 schools each year.

You Can't Be Too Careful Sixth Grade

The sixth grade program "You Can't Be Too Careful" is taught to approximately 2700 students in School District #203, School District #204 and all private schools in Naperville. This program is taught in two school days by a Crime Prevention Specialist and a Crime Prevention Officer, Elementary School Resource Officer or Middle School Resource Officer.

"You Can't Be Too Careful" addresses personal safety, home security and babysitting safety. The personal safety program informs students at this age about how "not" to become a "victim of a crime." When talking to students about home security, they are informed about how they can help keep their homes from being a target of a crime. The babysitting portion covers information that helps keep students safe when taking babysitting jobs, along with keeping the children safe they are babysitting. This program includes lecture, role-playing and the use of a video.

Runaway Prevention **Eighth Grade**

The "Runaway Prevention" program is taught to approximately 3000 students in School District #203, School District #204 and all private schools in Naperville. A Crime Prevention Specialist and a Youth Investigator, Juvenile Police Officer or Middle School Resource Officer teach this program in one classroom period. This program includes an introduction to the scope of the runaway problem, a discussion of why teens choose to runaway, a video, "Running Away: A Dead End," and concludes with student participation through role-play and discussion. Students are given alternatives or choices they might make if they are thinking about running away. All school safety or prevention programs include handout materials given to each student to review and share with their parents.
