nomination was well received and she was selected. On June 2, Lion Chris attended our club meeting to present Lion Donna with this prestigious award. Congratulations Lion Donna!



Luncheon Speakers

HEAR US, INC.

Diane Nilan, president and founder of Hear Us, Inc., was our guest speaker on June 9. Through Hear Us, Diane travels the country to create short films to be used for training and awareness. The subjects of all of her work are homeless children in all facets of society.

Diane began this journey 10 years ago and has since traveled 225,000 miles. Her motorhome is now her full time home. She has been to all 48 of the contiguous states and given speeches to Universities and even to Congress. She has created a number of films that allow homeless children to tell their stories and raise awareness of the rampant homelessness in this country. Many do not realize that there is homelessness in every community.

Homelessness comes in many forms. This includes those that are bouncing around from house to sleeping house couch. on а Domestic violence creates a lot of homelessness, as the mother will leave with the children. A school district where 10% of its students are homeless is common. 2.5 million school age children are reportedly homeless, but that number may be low because so many school districts do not keep this data.

Most school districts have a homeless liaison. Diane has a goal to get them in contact with her organization to learn and raise awareness on what is happening in their area and around the country. Part of her crusade has led to the passage of Charlie's Law, which allows homeless children to remain enrolled in their school despite the lack of a stable address.

After leaving our meeting, Diane was heading to Wichita. She is going to attend and document a summer camp for more than 110 homeless children. She is excited about this opportunity as it will be filming a positive event rather than the usual doom and gloom.

Hear Us is funded by donations, appearance fees, and video sales.

As it is the ten year anniversary, Diane has kicked off a program where donors donate \$10/month to the organization.

IMRF

On June 16, Louis Kosiba and John Krupa from the Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund (IMRF) were our guest speakers. IMRF was created in 1939 by the State of Illinois, however it is an independent fund not managed or funded by the state. IMRF has its own board of trustees who are all elected to help run the fund.

The IMRF provides retirement. disability, and death benefits for local government employees. This includes employees of cities. counties, park districts, and school districts (non-teachers). It does not include local fire or police personnel or Cook County employees. IMRF is part of a three-pronged retirement plan. It, along with Social Security and personal savings, makes up an individual's retirement income. Currently there are 2,976 units of local government participating in the fund.

IMRF is a large financial institution. They use a variety of 90 outside investment firms to create a highly diversified portfolio. They currently hold \$34.9 billion in assets and are the best-funded statewide system at 93%. Investments are so important as that income accounts for 63% of the total money in the fund. Louis explained that every dollar that was invested in 1980 is now worth \$28 today.

The IMRF is focused on continually evolving and working toward excellence. They ensure that the retirement reserve is always 100% funded and do an annual true up. Louis believes that pension systems sustainable. He thinks are implementing longer vesting periods with higher retirement ages and wage caps can help keep the retirement fund continually solvent.

Approved the Club and Foundation regular meeting minutes of May 26, 2015 and the membership meeting minutes of May 26, 2015.

Approved the Treasurer's Report as of May 31, 2015 and the Social Services Report as of June 23, 2015. For the fiscal year (which began July 1, 2014) \$102,144 has been expended for 370 closed cases. **Approved** the finance committee's recommendation to terminate the annuity investment of Harold White Funds at maturity in the amount of approximately \$48,000.

Approved a donation of \$25,000 from proceeds of the Harold White Fund to Foundation Fighting Blindness. These funds will be matched dollar for dollar by the Grund Family Challenge.

Approved an increased grant of \$5,000 to Hear Us, Inc. This increase is in addition to the previously approved \$2,000 to Hear Us, Inc.

Discussed possible dues assistance for a former member. This item was deferred to a future meeting pending additional information.
