RIBFEST

For the 29th straight year, our club sold funnel cakes at the Naperville Ribfest from June 30-July 3. While the weather was beautiful and the volunteers were eager, we unfortunately had one of our worst money-earning years ever.

This year, a total of 57 individuals volunteered, working a total of 108 shifts (467 hours). This included 21 Lions working 59 shifts and 36 volunteers working 49 shifts.

Despite having such eager workers and terrific product, the venue worked against us. The crowds were consolidated to the other side of the park (which was even closed off during the first night). As such, many attendees never made it down to our area. Our best night was on July 3, when the park was open to everyone for free for the fireworks show.

The gross receipts from this year's event were \$10,680.53. After expenses, the net profit was

\$4,876.12. That is a 63.9% decline over the last four years.

At this time, the club has tabled a discussion on whether to return to Ribfest again in 2018.

Despite the poor result, Lion Steve Hertzberg ran another seamless funnel cake operation and the club could not be more thankful.

LIONS INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION AND PARADE

Lion Jim Woodring spent some of his Fourth of July holiday weekend attending the Lions International Convention in Chicago. He was also joined by Lion Yllena Sinclare for the parade. Lion Jim noted that there were 30,500 Lions from 110 countries the in Chicago for convention.

He was surprised when Lions from other countries would approach him and begin removing pins right from his vest. He eventually purchased extra pins as to be better prepared.

NAPERVILLE MUNICIPAL BAND CONCERT BAKE SALE

The weather was perfect and over 1,000 concertgoers were on hand on July 27 to hear the music of the Naperville Band. NNLC hosted the bake sale at the concert with delicious pies, brownies, poppy seed cakes, chocolate covered pretzels, popcorn, and many other items.

Seventeen members of the club volunteered to work at the bake sale or bake goods for the sale. In addition, George and Linda Villa, members of the National Federation of the Blind, the Tolentino Family, and Braconi's Restaurant also provided baked goods.

Lion Steve Hertzberg took a break from his enthusiastic cymbal playing

to give a short announcement about the Lions from the bandstand. He gave a brief history of how the band and Lions Club members have intersected over time, including Mayor George Pradel.

Several raffle tickets were sold and a number of used eye glasses were collected. Thank you to all that volunteered.

We sold approximately \$1,200 of baked goods and should net about \$1,000. Final results will be available soon.

Luncheon Speakers

OPERATION SUPPORT OUR TROOPS

Bob Beck, who is a ten-year member of Operation Support Our Troops (OSOT), was our guest speaker on July 11. OSOT, which is a 501(c)(3) organization, was founded in 2003 for the purpose of providing comfort, resources, and education to our troops and their families. Their mission is accomplished by providing a link between the citizens and military personnel so that everyone has the opportunity to express their support.

OSOT sends comfort packages of items that are not readily available to

our troops in their deployed locations, along with personal letters, cards, and notes of support from the community. There are over 500 volunteers that support the care package mission and provide over 10,000 hours each year. Mr. Beck stated that over the last 13 years, two million pounds of various items have been distributed.

OSOT follows the guidelines of the Department of Defense with respect to mailing or sending packages to our Troops overseas and never sends unsolicited packages. Every package is sent at the request of military persons or family. Another program provided by OSOT is entitled "Leap of Faith". This program assists families of fallen service members live life fully in a way that honors the life of their service member. Other programs offered include yoga and assistance with finding jobs.

GIVING DUPAGE

Shefali Trivedi, Executive Director of Giving DuPage was also our guest speaker on July 11. The mission of Giving DuPage is to promote giving and volunteering in DuPage County. The organization was started as a volunteer center at DuPage County with a phone hotline and volunteer referral service. It formally began as Giving DuPage in 2001 and started by 2 local philanthropists. The current role of Giving DuPage is to connect volunteers and donors with local opportunities.

Giving DuPage provides many opportunities for individuals and

organizations. Non-profit organizations can post their volunteer needs on the Giving DuPage website, Individuals can establish a volunteer portal to search volunteer opportunities, volunteers are recognized at the "Volapolooza" annual breakfast, individuals can run and support other organizations by participating in the "DuPage Human Race" (a 5K run), attend NIU civic leadership academy or attend Front Line Families an AmeriCorp program, which engages and trains veteran service members and their families to become volunteer leaders in the community.

Ms. Trivedi indicated that the number one reason people do not volunteer is that they do not know there is a organization need by an volunteers. Giving DuPage gives these individuals the opportunity to find those volunteer needs. There are over 3,500 not-for-profit organizations in DuPage County. The need for volunteers is great, she indicated.

As part of their mission to promote giving and volunteering throughout DuPage County an annual giving guide is published. This guide lists over 200 local non-profit organizations (including NNLC) and is distributed by the Daily Herald each September to over 19,500 DuPage subscribers.

BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

The Board of Directors met on July Beidelman-Kunsch 25. 2017 at Funeral Home downtown in Naperville. The following is a summary of the Board's actions and discussions. All members are welcome to attend the Board meetings, which start at 7:30 a.m. The next Board meeting will be held on August 22, 2017.

Approved the Club and Foundation minutes for the meeting of June 27, 2017.

The Treasurer's Report as of June 30, 2017 was deferred until the August 22, 2017 meeting.

Approved the Social Service Report as of July 25, 2017. There were 22 new cases opened for the month.

Approved donation to National Alliance Mental Illness (NAMI) in support of their 5K run in the amount of \$1,000.

Approved full membership of Dick Lehman.

Discussed the following events: Bake Sale, Raffle, Turkey Trot, and Candy Day. Candy Day will be held on October 13-14.

Discussed the removal of the eye glass collection box, which has been located at the Naperville Township Office. The Township has requested that we relocate the box. They will continue to collect used eye glasses and place a sign in their window that they are a collection site. Alternative locations will be sought for the box.

Approved the cost of a shelf to be located in the Pradel Room at Braconi's. The self will be used to place various plaques, which honor the Naperville Noon Lions Club and Naperville Noon Lions Foundation.

Discussed the results of this year's funnel cake sales at Rib Fest. Net proceeds will be lower than what was expected. Net income was \$4,876 or a decrease of 64% from the average for the last four years. Consideration was given to possible withdrawal from this event as the return was not sufficient for the amount of work that is put into the event. A decision to withdraw was tabled until the December 2017 Board meeting.

Approved the renewal of the domain name for "napervillenoonlions.org" in the amount of \$38.

Discussed a possible fundraising event in connection with Iron Gate Auto Condos. It was concurred that additional information was needed and it would be explored for the future.

Discussed the possibility of adding a luncheon on the fifth Tuesday of the month. This item was deferred until the next meeting.
