Luncheon Speakers

LITERACY DUPAGE

On May 1, Janice Anderson was our guest speaker. Janice is a board member for Literacy DuPage, a non-profit social services organization that helps residents learn to read and write.

Literacy DuPage was founded in 1922 in Naperville. Their main service is training and matching volunteer tutors to teach adults to read, write, speak, and otherwise communicate in English.

The organization works very closely with libraries and most tutoring sessions occur in these libraries. Tutors and students are matched personally to one-another based on compatibility, location, and schedules.

Literacy DuPage is always looking to add to its more than 400 volunteer tutors. A new tutor need not know any language other than English.

There is also no requirement for teaching experience. The tutor must

attend an orientation and training. After that, they generally commit to weekly sessions with their students and a one-year overall commitment.

SCARCE

Kay McKean was our guest speaker on May 8. Kay was educating our group about SCARCE, an organization whose mission is to keep natural resources out of landfills by reuse and recycling.

SCARCE has a location in Glen Ellyn where they allow items to be dropped off for recycling. Once received, they work to find a place for the reuse of the items.

SCARCE rescues musical instruments, books, records, sewing machines, and much more. They have 80,000 books on hand and in their existence have donated more than 7 million books to teachers for use in classrooms.

Kay told us about the organization's crayon rescue program. They take all type of crayons in all conditions. Once received, they melt the crayons down and mold them into new fun shapes, like dinosaurs and cars. These shapes are much larger than traditional crayons and easier for many special needs children to manipulate. All of these crayons are donated.

Kay has been an author of 11 laws that deal with disposal. She taught the club about what items can and cannot be recycled. Naperville is a rare city that offers recycling of many hazardous materials that should be kept out of landfills.

KIDS ALIVE

Mike Busch from Kids Alive International was our guest speaker on May 15. Kids Alive was founded in 1916 and works to find and rescue orphans and forgotten children around the world. They are currently working in 15 different countries, most of which have no real social safety net to speak of.

Kids Alive operates orphanages in these countries, but only about 10% of the children live in these. They also work in care centers and on social outreach. In these care centers, children receive education, meals, and healthcare services.

In Guatemala, Kids Alive has "Oasis," which is a center for girls who have been the victims of sex trafficking or abuse.

In all of the homes and care centers around the world, 90% of the staff is made up of locals. Through this organization, kids receive care until they are 18 and sometimes longer.

FUSION PROJECT

On May 29, Michelle Jenks was our speaker. Michelle is the founder of the Fusion Project, a program for junior high girls to build self-esteem.

Michelle became aware of research about sex predators and traffickers and learned that young girls with low self-esteem were prime targets for these individuals. She believes that

starting early and building selfesteem will act as a natural deterrent to these predators.

She learned that these predators typically interact with the victims for a long time. These interactions usually begin with a compliment at the mall. The relationship grows from there and eventually the girl is taken advantage of.

The Fusion Project is an after school program running in Oswego and Aurora and is in the process of coming to Naperville. It is a weekly program where girls can come and not be judged or told they are doing something wrong.

The groups are run by volunteer adults and some high school girls. The group gives them a safe place where they can discuss all of their junior high issues.

The sign up process can begin with either the parents or the participant. The program lasts the whole school year and Michelle is working on summer activities and a program for boys as well.

The Board of Directors met on May 22, 2018 at Beidelman-Kunsch funeral Home in downtown Naperville. The following is a

summary of the Board's actions and discussions. All members are welcome to attend the Board meetings, which start at 7:30 a.m. The next Board meeting will be held on June 26, 2018.

Approved the Club and Foundation regular meeting minutes of April 24, 2018.

The Treasurer's Report for April 30, 2018 was deferred until the next Board meeting.

Approved the following donations:

- JDRF \$2,000
- Almost Home Kids \$1,000
- It's All About Children \$1,000
- Indian Prairie Ed Foundation -\$500
- LCIF Measles \$1,000
- Diabetes Awareness Camp -\$1,000
- Student Grant (Hearing) \$500

Approved grant of \$3,000 to Donka, Inc. in memory of Lion Bill McManus. A letter will be sent to Lion Bill's wife to notify her of the donation.

Discussed purchase of raffle tickets from various organizations which the Foundation supports and possibility increasing the Club budget for this type of expenditure. This item was deferred till the next Board meeting.

Approved the Social Service report as of May 22, 2018. There were 26 new cases for May 2018 and 294 individuals served thru April 2018. Total expenditures for the year to date totaled approximately \$97,000.

Discussed that total expenditures for the fiscal year may exceed the budget. More information will be available at the next Board meeting.

The Club has purchased seven more comfort toys from Paramount Theatre in Aurora. Also, an individual has made available at no cost 100 beanie babies for the comfort toy program.

The Catholic Order of Forrester's have completed their eye glass collection program and will deliver the glasses at a noon luncheon meeting. Eye glass collection project at Pivotal Solutions is still in process.

The Raffle Committee met this week. Raffle ticket will be distributed to Club members at the luncheon meeting on May 22, 2018. Raffle ticket sales will officially begin on June 1, 2018.

Discussed Lions Tag Day. \$1,764 was collected on May 12 and 13. Additional tag day will be held on June 8 and 9.

Discussed eye glass collection box at the Post Office. A 2-foot by 2-foot concrete base will have to be constructed before the eye glass collection box can be located at the Post Office. No date has been scheduled for placing the eye glass collection box at the Post Office.

Discussed the scheduling of the Lions of Illinois Foundation hearing van. The van has been scheduled for July 11, 2018 in support of DuPage County Veterans Assistance Program. More information will be available at the next Board meeting.

Discussed the use of Lions Club International app and the video shot to be held on May 22, 2018 at St. Michael's Church in Wheaton.

Discussed the Club's participation in the Angelman Syndrome Foundation Walk on May 19, 2018. The Club provided 12.5 volunteer hours to assist with set up of the event.
