Since then it has grown to the world's largest service organization with 1.4 million members in 210 countries. We naturally focus much effort on serving the Naperville area but it's inspirational to learn of the great variety of services provided by Lions worldwide as thev mark the Centennial of service.

For example, the Lions Club of Montego Bay Jamaica partnered Canadian with Vision Care Volunteers to open a new vision clinic where people receive glaucoma and cataract exams and get prescription glasses. Leos and Lions in Latin America and the Caribbean organized 800 clubs from 17 countries to collect and distribute food donations. In Nepal, the Kathmandu Lions donated a new six

room schoolhouse to replace one damaged in the recent earthquake. And Lions even save rhinos. MD 410 Lions have launched an international marketing campaign to raise awareness of the plight of the last remaining wild rhinos.

These are just a few of the thousands of service projects conducted by Lions tailored to the needs of their local communities. A future challenge will be maintaining membership and service dedication with so much time devoted to Facebook, Twitter, web surfing, and other electronic distractions. An encouraging sign is the Lions International report that hundreds of thousands of new members have ioined to continue to build on the impressive Lions service legacy.

Luncheon Speakers

SIDE BY SIDE SMILES

Our group was joined by two very dedicated and impressive high school juniors, Sanjana Gangadharan and Nandini Arakoni. Sanjana and Nandini are lifelong friends. Nandini was born with a cleft lip that was successfully repaired when she was only two months old.

Because of Nandini's experience, the girls have an awareness of cleft lip and palate birth defects. They came to know that 1 in 700 children is born with a cleft lip or palate and it is the second most prevalent birth defect after Down syndrome.

In the United States, these defects are relatively easy to repair with a In the developing world, surgery. many children born this way do not have access to this surgerv. however. This can lead to a lifetime of difficulties including ostracization and difficulty eating and/or speaking. Saniana and Nandini felt devastated that these children did not have access to a readily available remedy.

They decided that they wanted to help. They formed their nonprofit, Side by Side Smiles, with the goal of selling jewelry to fund these surgeries. They have partnered with Smile Train, which is an organization that performs and trains local doctors to perform these surgeries in the developing world.

Each surgery costs only \$250 with Smile Train. This organization takes care of the surgery and all post-op care as well as providing counselors to explain and guide each family.

The girls started out with charm bracelets and have expanded to new items. In the year and a half since starting the charity, they have raised over \$25,000. They maintain a goal of \$100,000 before the end of 2020. They spend much of their free time on the organization and hope that it will continue far into the future.

LOAVES AND FISHES

On August 14, Eric Gardner was our guest speaker from Loaves and Fishes. Loaves and Fishes mission is to end hunger and transform lives. It started in the church closet at St. Raphael in 1984 and has grown into an organization that feeds 19,000 people per year.

Loaves and Fishes operates a food pantry that is set up like a grocery store. Clients can shop for the food that they want and get to select a certain number of items from different categories based on their family size.

They partner with local farms and stores as well as the Northern Illinois Food Bank to procure their food. Every day, they need 80-100 volunteers to run the organization. The number of hours worked by volunteers annually equates to 47 additional full-time employees.

They have also joined forces with Naperville Cares and offers a variety of non-food-based assistance to their clients. These range from emergency cash assistance, to help with taxes, to computer and English classes.

JULIE & GAVIN STAAB

On August 21, Julie Staab was our guest speaker to update the group on the progress of her son, Gavin. Gavin has Angelman Syndrome which is a genetic disorder that affects Gavin in many ways, including inhibiting him from communicating verbally.

This is the third year that Julie and Gavin have presented at our meetings. Julie informed the club that Gavin is high-functioning, but does have many difficulties. These include anxiety, sleep issues, and communicating verbally.

Each year, Gavin takes a trip to Boston to meet with Angelman Syndrome specialists. This year, after much practice, Gavin was able to balance on one foot. The doctor who was evaluating Gavin said that he had never had an Angelman Syndrome patient capable of that feat.

Julie and her family work every day with Gavin on speech, physical, and occupational therapy. He also attends formal therapy sessions every week. She showed us that Gavin has learned to write his name now and can read some words. Tasks that doctors said he would never be able to accomplish.

Gavin is capable of doing many activities that his brother and sister do. He rides a bike (with training wheels), swims, and plays Go Fish. He loves to fish with his grandpa Al.

Gavin uses technology to communicate. He has a sound board with pictures that he can touch to communicate a person or thing. He can also use apps on phones or tablets to accomplish the same purpose.
