CANDY DAY

FANNIE MAY

Our club has been offered a unique fundraising opportunity through Fannie May in Naperville. This is a terrific fundraising opportunity with almost no cost or energy expended.

Luncheon Speakers

MUSCULAR DYSTROPHY ASSOCIATION

On October 2, Amanda Spies was our guest speaker from the Muscular Dystrophy Association, an organization that has been around for 65 years. Their primary goals are to find treatment for more than 65 neuro muscular diseases and also provide care for families who have been affected.

They have 175 studies currently being funded. These diseases are all progressive and they hope that a breakthrough in one study may help lead to breakthroughs for treatment of other diseases. The future is bright. The organization has been involved in four new treatments recently approved by the FDA. They receive over 200 requests for grants annually but can only fund about 16 studies.

The organization also operates care centers that house a multidisciplinary care team. A patient can make one appointment and meet with a variety of providers rather than making many appointments.

Amanda was proud to tell the club about the MDA Summer Camp. This is a one-week completely free camp for kids ages 8-17 who suffer from muscular dystrophy or another related disease. The camper is paired one on one with a counselor who is highly trained. The camp provides the children more independence while also giving their parents a break. The summer camp is run completely by volunteers and the organization is always looking for more. This year, more than 100 kids enjoyed camp in Hudson, IL.

METROPOLITAN FAMILY SERVICES

Our club welcomed Elise Schram and Latoya Hendrickson from Metropolitan Family Services as our guest speakers on October 9.

Elise discussed the organization's early childhood programs. They work with more than 50 local agencies to improve kindergarten/school readiness in children under 5. They work to reach kids who need it most so that they will be best prepared to learn once school begins.

Their improving goals include communication early among childhood providers and educating parents about childhood development needs. They also work professional increase the to development childhood of early providers.

They provide preschool options throughout the area. These include head start, full day and half day preschool. The also operate a home-based prevention initiative.

One major event for Metropolitan Family Services is the Family Day of Play. At this event, families can bring their children for a day filled with activities. Α group of organizations is also invited, and this provides an opportunity for the children to be screened and introduced to different services.

HEAR US

Lion Maria Wilson spoke to the club on October 16 about Hear Us. The organization was started in 2005 by Diane Nilan who had previously worked for Hesed House, but wanted to continue to provide a voice for homeless children.

Diane sold her home and bought an RV and began traveling around the country to tell the stories of homeless children. Through these efforts, Diane has written books and created documentary style videos in an effort to raise awareness.

Hear Us recently petitioned the city council to designate November as Naperville Homeless Kids Month. Through a collaboration with 360 Youth Services, this became a reality.

The goal of Homeless Kids Month is to raise awareness and get individuals and organizations to pledge to do one or more things to help. Turkey Trot is an especially unique opportunity to raise awareness as Thanksgiving is the worst day for the homeless all year. Our club will have a Hear Us table set up at Turkey Trot this year and the organization is looking to expand its reach for next year.

YMCA SAFE AND SOUND

On October 23 Erika Wood, Executive Director or the YMCA Safe and Sound Program described the program's objectives and its commitment to providing safe and enriching care for school ade children during out of school time. The mission of the Program is about changing lives for the better in three ways: youth development, healthy living, and social responsibility.

The program was started by the Y in 1983 and serves approximately 1,100 children annually. This is one of the largest out of school time providers in the Naperville/Aurora area and they operate the program in DuPage, Will, and Kane Counties, Erika stated. Children kindergarten age through 5th grade are eligible to participate and 89% of children come back year after year.

Programs consist of supporting working parents through child care, summer camps which are an enriching and safe experience for school age children, non-school day support to provide care during holidays, teacher institutes etc. and a counselor-in-training program which provides an opportunity for older youths (ages 13-15) to develop effective leadership skills.

The Safe and Sound Program has approximately 100 professional trained staff and has provided \$234,000 in support of low-income families. There are many community partners that support the program including School District 203, Linden Oaks, 360 Youth Services, Kids Matter and the Naperville Noon Lion Foundation. Our Foundation has been a major financial contributor to the "Y" Safe and Sound Program for many years and the "Y" Safe and Sound program staff has provided major volunteer support for our Thanksgiving morning Turkey Trot.

The 2016 Run to Feed the Hungry in

Sacramento was the largest ever Turkey Trot with 29,022 participants.

Discussed progress of Turkey Trot. Receipts total \$80,000 to date and problems with website have been resolved.

Discussed funds which are to be received from Lisle Eyes to the Skies. The money which is due to the NNLC has not been received. This item will be followed up at next Board meeting.

Discuss final report for Candy Days. 13 Lions volunteered, with total

collections of \$6,764. Expenses were \$475. The Board concurred this was a very successful event.

Discussed OrCam unit for Brian McManus. More information is needed and the item will be deferred until the next Board meeting.

Approved \$344 for printing of coupons for Fanny May fund raiser. Coupon will be distributed at packet pick up. Naperville Noon Lion Foundation will receive 30% of Fanny May sales when the coupon is presented. The coupon is good for sales on December 1, 2018.

Discussed the main eye glass collection box which had been located at the Naperville Township Offices. Progress has been made to re-locate the box at the main Post Office on Washington Street, but the Post Office location has not been finalized. This item will be discussed at the next Board meeting.

Approved \$40 for payment of renewal of domain website name for the Club.
