A New Page for Lions

Lions International has spent considerable effort developing a new webpage to better help clubs and individuals in their mission of service. Here are some features of the new page:

The Service Launchpad

Here we can find advice and information on selecting a service project related to the Lions' five global causes: diabetes, hunger, vision, childhood cancer, and the environment. For example, answering some questions about an environmental project returned an eight page checklist document with suggestions on conducting a tree planning at a local school.

The Resource Center

As you can imagine, LCI has assembled an impressive library of information and provided tools for quick searching for what you need. It also suggests Featured Resources including Community Needs Assessment, Fund Raising, and info about Model Clubs. Searching Vision returns seven pages of videos, technical articles, PDFs, and Power Point presentation.

The Club Locator

With 48,000 clubs worldwide, having a powerful tool for searching for information is a must. One can search by keyword or location to home in on the desired result. Searching Morton, IL brings up club info and several nearby along with a form for use in contacting them. Costa Rica returns 32 clubs. And this web app is fully integrated with the mobile phone app called MyLion so information is shared between the platforms.

Enhanced Storytelling

Here is a repository of some of the amazing things accomplished by Lions worldwide. One story describes how Lions of Iowa

partnered with the University of Iowa in 2007 to address Leber congenital amaurosis (LCA), a genetically inherited eye condition causing blindness from birth. Since that researchers have time. been working toward a gene therapy to help treat patients with LCA, and in 2017 their efforts resulted in helping sight to affected restore individuals. In December 2017, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved this treatment. It is the first gene therapy in the U.S. for a genetically inherited disease, and the first in which the patient directly receives a corrective gene.

BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

The Board of Directors met on December 4, 2018 at Beidelman-Kunsch Funeral Home in downtown Naperville. The following is a summary of the Board's actions and discussions. All members are welcome to attend the Board meetings, which start at 7:30 a.m. The next Board meeting will be held on January 22, 2019.

Approved the Club and Foundation regular meeting minutes of October 30, 2018

Approved the Club and Foundation Treasurer's Report for October 31, 2018.

Approved the Social Service Report as of November 2018. Total expenditures for the current fiscal year (thru November 2018) totaled \$35,641. This amount is significantly lower than the previous fiscal year to date.

Approved donation to the Naperville Christian Academy in the amount of \$500 and to the Boy Scouts Troop 501 in the amount of \$250.

Discussed membership activities. There are two possible individuals who have indicated interest in joining the Club.

Discussed Publicity Activities. Two articles were included in Naperville Sun regarding the Turkey Trot along with a letter to the editor thanking all participants. An application has been submitted to the Park District to reserve the Naperville Community Sign Board for 2019 Turkey Trot. The Park District has disposed of all out-of-date Turkey Trot signs which were used on the Community Sign Board.

Discussed Turkey Trot. Over 7,200 individuals registered for the run and approximately 6,400 individuals crossed the finish line. Although registrations are down, this year's run is expected to be successful. Final results will be available at a later date.

A check in the amount of \$3,168 was received for the Club's services regarding Lisle Eye to the Skies volunteer project. The Club was paid at the rate of \$15 per hour of volunteer time. Briefly discussed the Club's participation for next year.

Discussed the Fannie May fund raiser on December 1, 2018. \$41 was received as a result of this fund raiser. Discussed the possibilities of doing another fund raiser in this area. Several suggestions were considered regarding what could be done differently in order to increase participation.

Discussed the relocation of the Club's central eye glass collection box to the Naperville Post Office. A letter has been written to the Naperville Post Master regarding the box location. More information will be available at a future meeting.

An inquiry has been received from the Naperville Police Department regarding how the Lions could support the police social service program. A representative from the Police Department will be invited to a luncheon meeting to discuss how the Club could assist the Police Department.

Information has been received regarding the completion of the Illinois Charitable Organization Annual Report. The completion of this form will be reviewed and follow-up by the Club Treasurer.
