LIONS IN WINTER

Winter seems a quieter time for Lions, with fewer projects underway calling for multiple volunteers. It's a time for interacting with the 60+ organizations we support, planning our traditional projects considering new possibilities for service or fundraising events. One traditional activity has participation in the Naperville Feed My Starving Children event in February. Last year over a million nutrition-balanced meals were packed in one weekend at North Central College.

In addition, Lions service activities continue in Illinois and for the 1.4 million members worldwide. Browsing Lion Magazine, one can find examples of the variety service projects undertaken. The Larsen-Winchester Lions built a wheelchair ramp for an 86-year-old farmer. It was the club's 1000th ramp. The Lions of Potchefstroom South Africa

operate periodic pop-up soup kitchens, serving hundreds per day. Lions of Indiana District 25F bought 264 acres of pristine woods and created Camp Woodsmoke providing no cost camping for about 5,000 special needs kids per year. The ways Lions find to serve is pretty amazing.

Lions International is able to make large contributions to support vision and hearing projects and fight hunger and diabetes. In fact, during the 50 vears of the Lions International Foundation they have provided more than 13,000 grants exceeding \$1 billion. These accomplishments are made possible by the donations and dues of members along with corporate support. So even members who cannot attend all meetings participate in vigorous projects still make their mark through just being a Lion.

Of course, when other activities are reduced we have opportunities to participate with other Lions beyond Naperville. Upcoming are the SE Region meeting Feb 13 in Darien, the District 1-J Convention April 5-7 at the Naperville Marriott and the 99th state MD-1 convention May 17-19 in

Springfield. And for something different, the 41st LDUN—Lions Day at the United Nations in NYC, this year with the theme "Protecting Our Future: The Health of Our Children". As always, there is a lot going on.

Luncheon Speakers

CHILD'S VOICE

Kate Bosoum was our guest speaker from Child's Voice on January 15.

Kate was on hand to provide an update on Child's Voice ahead of our group's trip on March 19.

Child's Voice works to help deaf children with cochlear implants and/or hearing aids learn to listen and speak. They have locations in Wood Dale and Chicago.

Child's Voice runs an audiology center that provides full diagnostic testing and newborn screening for babies. They also offer full pediatric audiology services.

The organization also provides early intervention for children ages birth-3. They go into the child's home and work with the family. They coordinate group activities and direct speech therapy. They introduce sound at this early stage to help digest and develop the brain's ability to heard and process sounds.

Child's Voice also operates a fully functioning school program for children ages 3-8. This school works very similarly to a preschool and the goal is to transition all children to their home school district. work on developing the sound the children hear and continue developing their listening and speaking skills.

The school program is funded primarily by the child's home school district. It is estimated that a child who has graduated from Child's Voice will save the school district over \$350,000 over his/her education because they will need minimal assistance going forward.

Our club will be visiting Child's Voice on March 19. During that visit, we will be able to interact with the children and see all of the great things that Child's Voice does.

RIVERWALK ADULT DAY SERVICES

Marian Stricker and Susan Walters-Flood were our guest speakers on January 29. They were on hand to inform the club about Riverwalk Adult Day Services, an organization that provides a safe, socially-stimulating environment for adults who cannot be left alone.

The organization was started in 1983 by a group of 15 religious organizations. They saw the benefits of aging in one's home. There is more independence, a familiar environment, and it is cost efficient when compared to a nursing home or assisted living setting.

They are located just west of the library in downtown Naperville. Caregivers can drop off clients during the day and they will be provided with a highly-trained staff who provide activities throughout the day. In addition, the client will be able to socialize with other clients, which has been proven to enrich and extend lives.

Caregivers deal with a tremendous amount of stress and this provides a respite from the stress.

Riverwalk is focused on more community education and involvement in 2019. They are holding Tuesday Talks on the

second Tuesday of each month as well as quarterly Senior Saturday Events.

Currently, the center has room for about 25 daily clients, but averages only 6-8. They are hoping to reach more clients. The center charges \$72 per day for its services, which is much more affordable than in-home or institutional care.
