#### **CLUB EXCELLENCE AWARD**



Feed My Starving Children held its annual mobile pack event at North Central College on February 16-17. As always, our club supported the event through a donation and with volunteer help. The event showcased a number of financial donors and we were one of the largest.

# Luncheon Speakers

## SHARON GOODWIN

On February 5, Sharon Goodwin was our speaker. Sharon spoke with us about her mission trip to Rwanda. With her church, Sharon has been taking annual mission trips to test vision and distribute eyeglasses.

Her most recent trip was to Butare, which is the second largest city in Rwanda. This country was devastated by the Rwandan genocide, wherein 15-20% of the population was murdered in 1994.

As a country, Rwanda has bounced back and is the most progressive country in Sub-Sahara Africa. Unlike some other developing nations, the Rwandan government loves that Sharon and her group are there to help.

Through their missions, Sharon and her group have learned to test vision as lay people. While they cannot provide as precise of services as optometrists, they are still able to provide patients with glasses that greatly enhance their vision.

In Rwanda, there are only 14 ophthalmologists in the entire country. While in Butare, Sharon worked with a husband and wife ophthalmologist duo who helped to perform cataract surgeries. While not the most sterile environment, the surgeries are done in about 10 minutes and are relatively pain-free. Sharon showed us a short video of a woman who, after having the surgery, was able to see more than just shapes and shadows. It was a very moving video.

## TOUCH MY HEART

Rick Montalbano, Jr., founder of Touch My Heart, was our speaker on February 12. After working his whole life in the furniture business, Rick and his family started Touch My Heart in 2010 as an organization to help those with special needs.

Touch My Heart is based in Naperville and the majority of their services are provided to the Naperville community. They reach nearly 5,000 people per year, with 75% of those being disabled adults.

Rick has worked to involve Boy Scouts and has worked with more than 50 Eagle Scout projects impacting special needs. He has also created a food distribution program wherein he delivers food four times per week. This food is usually donated by Panera at the end of the day and delivered the next morning to those in need.

Touch My Heart has also produced theater productions with casts of entirely special needs actors. They also partner with Drury Lane for an annual Christmas party at the theater.

#### FOUNDATION FIGHTING BLINDNESS

Lion Steve Sroka was our guest speaker to discuss Foundation Fighting Blindness. Lion Steve was sure to thank us for our generous \$25,000 grant which was matched by the Gund Foundation. He was proud to tell us that we were the only Lions Club to donate a full \$25,000.

Lion Steve gave us a brief refresher on Foundation Fighting Blindness (FFB). The organization has been around for 40 years with a mission to drive research to provide treatment and prevention of retinal degenerative diseases. FFB is the largest non-governmental source of fundraising for this endeavor in the world, having raised over \$800 million.

Each year, they are able to fund about 130 grants, but have to turn many away. Currently, there are 35 ongoing clinical trials which is incredible. Because of the results of these trials, private companies are beginning to invest which has allowed even more research.

Recently, the first FDA approved gene therapy has gone into production and the results have been dramatic. There are a number of companies completing trials and working to get new drugs into the market.

Lion Steve wanted to let us know about the Vision Walk which will take place in Elk Grove Village on June 2. This is a fun event that he hopes to get more Lions Clubs involved in.
