Over more than 50 the Lions International vears Foundation has provided hundreds of millions of dollars to fund projects spanning the globe. Today the international causes are diabetes.

vision, hunger, environment, and childhood cancer.

One example of the Lions impact is the 11-year project between the University of Iowa and Lions which researched Leber congenital amaurosis (LCA), a genetic condition causing blindness in young children. The project developed a gene therapy which is marketed by Sparks Therapeutics and become the first FDA-approved gene therapy in 2017.

We typically think of service dogs as assisting the blind, but thanks to Lions they are doing more. Using grants from Minnesota Lions Multiple District 5M and Lions International Foundation, Can Do Canines was founded in 1989 and has provided more than 600 dogs and has a waiting list of 184. Alan Peters of Harmony, Minn. is a recipient, sharing his life with a black Lab named Gilbert. Peters is diabetic: Gilbert faithfully paws him if his blood glucose goes below 100 or above 140. A welcome addition to the common medical CAT scan.

Measles, once considered a childhood rite of passage, is known to be a life-threatening virus that can leave survivors with brain damage,

deaf, and blind. Rubella virus also causes miscarriages and defects. Lions International Foundation, Lions Multiple District 307 in Indonesia and government of Indonesia have joined forces to launch an immunization project to protect 70 million children (95%) with the goal of eliminating measles and rubella from Indonesia by 2020. Unfortunate that measles is a returning concern in the U.S, experiencing the second highest number of cases in two decades. It's one more example of the harm done by misinformation spreading on the Internet.

These are just a few examples of the continuing global impact of Lions service projects. It's no wonder that Lions pride is a common term.

NAPERVILLE CHRISTIAN ACADEMY

Rebecca Ruff and Ann Nikchevich were our guest speakers on March 12. They are both administrators for Naperville Christian Academy. Naperville Christian Academy was founded in 2000 by a small group of parents who wanted their children to have a classical education. A classical education is one that focuses on original materials rather than relying on secondary sources.

The school is not affiliated with any school district or church. They are independent and, as such, entirely funded by tuition and donations.

The school does not have its own building and conducts all business at Trinity Church of the Nazarene in Naperville. They began with just a kindergarten class and expanded by one grade each year as their student body aged.

The school is not currently accredited, but the administration is considering seeking accreditation in the near future. The curriculum is set by the faculty and the principal with guidance from a national organization. Tuition ranges from \$8,800 - \$10,000 per year and the school does offer financial aid and scholarships.
