PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Safe Lion: Happy Lion

At least being safe in our activities lets us concentrate on the service task at hand. We have several activities where extra care is needed to keep ourselves and the public safe. Working out in traffic such as on Candy Day calls for a high level of alertness and, of course, use of bright yellow safety vests. Reports of distracted drivers are common so extra vigilance on our part is prudent, watching traffic although while interacting with a donor takes some effort. Similar concerns are present while picking trash along Plainfield-Naperville Road and during Turkey Trot.

Distractions can affect us when driving or walking. Using a handheld phone while driving is illegal; Naperville Police are especially alert for this. Although we all think we're "smarter than the average bear", tests have shown that even a handsfree device can distract the brain. One that I recall was a reporter visiting the Ford research center. He was put in a very sophisticated auto simulator (VIRTTEX) and was asked to take a phone call hands free. While interacting with the call he drove into the back of a truck. Video showed his eyes looking ahead yet he did not react at all to the danger. Sobering.

Reports and examples of distracted driving are legion. Even after a period of fine weather, drive by the auto body shop next to Loaves & Fishes to see the continuing flood of mangled sheet metal. Some studies have found that texting while driving increases the chance of accident by 23 times. Insurance companies have been raising premiums, citing the increased cost of distracted driving.

Illinois is home to Scott's Law (625 ILCS 5/11-907(c)) named after Lt Scott Gillen of Chicago FD, killed by a motorist while assisting at a crash. When encountering emergency vehicles with flashing lights, it requires drivers to slow down and change lanes if possible. Penalty can be loss of license and \$10,000. Despite this, three Illinois troopers have lost their lives in 2019 as a drivers result of speeding or distracted at a traffic incident. Three trooper deaths are the most in a single year in the last 66 years, according to the department. A total of 17 state troopers have been struck by vehicles this year alone, and in 15 of those cases, drivers were violating Scott's Law, which requires drivers to move over for emergency vehicles.

So, let us be alert and safety-aware in our Lions and personal activities. And if we have Lions plates or decals on our vehicles, it's further incentive to be a good example on the road.

Luncheon Speakers

SPEAKER

On April 2, Courtney Bronec from DuPage Fox Valley Easter Seals was our speaker. Courtney is the volunteer and community engagement coordinator. Last year she helped to coordinate more than 300 individual volunteers.

Her organization has been in the DuPage area for 75 years. Today, they have three locations, Villa Park, Naperville, and Elgin. Each year they help 3,200 infants, children, and young adults with developmental disabilities. Easter Seals provides physical and occupational therapy, speech and language programs, assistive technology, and family support. They work with a family-centered approach, encouraging families to take part in all aspects of the therapy.

Volunteers are an important aspect of the organization. They help in all different areas, including administrative tasks, organization, cleaning, and setting up therapy. They also get many volunteers from schools and colleges including occupational and physical therapy students.

LAND OF LINCOLN QUILTS OF VALOR

Rita Pennington from Land of Lincoln Quilts of Valor was our guest speaker on April 9. She was joined by her husband, Gary. Quilts of Valor is an organization that makes quilts and presents them to veterans. Rita is the state coordinator and she works to spread the word and recruit quilters.

The goal of Quilts of Valor is award essentially a civilian Medal of Honor. It is a thank you for service to our country. The veterans who receive these quilts cherish them more than their medals.

The quilts are made from highquality materials. The quilts can take as long as three months to complete. In Northern Illinois, 300-400 quilts are awarded each year. This presentation was extra special as Rita presented a quilt to Lion Ken Strugalla at our meeting. This quilt was made by Karen Butz, wife of Lion Rick Butz.

After being quilted, Lion Ken gave the club a brief history of his service. Lion Ken was a survival assistance officer. He was tasked with informing families when a soldier died and helping to arrange the funeral service. Lion Ken emotionally recounted the different reactions he would receive and how difficult each and every experience was.

ANGELMAN SYNDROME FOUNDATION WALK

Jon Timbers, Angelman Syndrome Foundation Walk Coordinator, was our guest speaker on April 16. This is his third year as coordinator. He thanked us for our support of the walk each year, including this year at the walk on May 18. Jon informed us of new research that is being performed including research into gene therapy that may be used to alter the gene that causes Angelman Syndrome. In addition to funding research, the organization provides support for families affected by Angelman Syndrome.

The walk takes place on May 18 in Lisle. This is the Chicagoland event, but there are more than 40 other walks throughout the country that day. Over two-thirds of the funds raised by the foundation is raised during the walk. Last year, the Chicagoland event raised \$130,000 which is 10% of the total nationwide.
