#### Our New Fiscal Year Budget

The budget team of Donna Kearney, Linda Strugalla, myself and presented the club and foundation proposed budgets for the new fiscal vear. Both were accepted as presented. The foundation budget reflects a \$19,000 reduction in our fundraisers, which is mainly due to increased costs for Turkey Trot shirts. To offset this loss, we have reduced our donations for several organizations.

We have already completed the first month of the raffle sales and are slightly behind last year by \$200 (\$6,200 current vs. \$6,400 last year). ### **Luncheon Speakers**

#### JUDGE MCCLUSKEY

DuPage County Judge James McCluskey was our guest speaker on June 4. Judge McCluskey is currently an associate judge for the Eighteenth Judicial Circuit and is also serving as president of the Illinois State Bar Association.

Judge McCluskey gave the group a basic overview of the judicial branch in DuPage County. In state court, judges are either appointed (associate) or elected (circuit). Once a judge has been elected circuit judge, no one can run against him/her in future elections. The future elections are merely for retention and voters choose to either retain or not retain.

Judge McCluskey explained that both types of judges do the same work for the court system. He also explained that the election process for choosing circuit judges is difficult due to a lack of public education about the judges.

Judge McCluskey discussed how judges are evaluated. This is done through polls sent to attorneys who appear in front of the judges. These are commissioned by local bar associations. The results of these polls are available to the public and cover all aspects of a judge's job performance.

He informed our club that Illinois judges are some of the most well-compensated judges in the country. Associate judges earn approximately \$198,000 annually while circuit judges earn approximately \$208,000.

#### LITTLE FRIENDS

On June 11, Jason Altenbern and Mike Briggs were our speakers from Little Friends. They thanked us for the many years of support from our club to their organization. Little Friends provides services to individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

It is estimated that 42.8 million people in the U.S. have a disability. That equates to 13.2% of the entire population. This includes 6.7 million children.

Little Friends noticed that many people were having trouble getting diagnostic testing, sometimes waiting up to two years. To combat that, Little Friends started doing this diagnostic testing and the wait time is about two months.

Little Friends is divided into five programs: 1) Center for maior Autism, 2) School, 3) Adult Day Community Services. 4) Residential Services, and the newest addition 5) Respite Care for families.

The Center for Autism program starts at 18 months old and provides therapy and services through end of life. They also operate three schools and 38 homes.

The latest project is a 74,000 square foot building in Warrenville that will allow them to greatly expand the school. It is especially special because the facility is all one floor. This means that Little Friends can accommodate individuals in wheelchairs for the first time ever. The old building has been sold to North Central College.
