Luncheon Speakers

NAPERVILLE COMMUNITY RADIO WATCH

On August 6, Dan Bulley was our guest speaker from Naperville Community Radio Watch. Dan has worked with Lion Jim Woodring and his wife Linda through Community Radio Watch.

Naperville Community Radio Watch (CRW) was started in 1982 by a group of Naperville residents who drove around the neighborhood and reported activity on their CB radios. It was eventually recognized and adopted by the police department and they are now outfitted with the same radios as police officers. Former Mayor Pradel recognized the CRW with badges.

CRW members do not have any police powers or authority. They also carry no weapons. They travel around during patrols in their personal vehicles and wear street clothes. They serve essentially as the eyes and ears of the police department.

CRW members are trained to recognize problems and things/people that do not belong. If they notice something irregular, they radio it into the police department who can then come out and investigate. Sometimes the mere presence of CRW members in a given area will cause problem starters to leave.

Anyone is welcome to come to a CRW meeting which occur on the first Thursday of every month at the police department.

LOAVES & FISHES

Our club visited Loaves & Fishes on August 13 and were given a tour and information by Eric Gardner. Eric informed our group that Loaves & Fishes is working to expand its focus to providing healthier foods. They are also working to promote selfsufficiency with their various social services and Cares programs.

We were given a tour of the facility which is rather impressive. The food distribution area is set up similarly to a grocery store and families are able to select from a variety of items in different categories. The entire building was staffed by dozens of volunteers who were helping in all areas.

Loaves & Fishes had 100,000 hours donated by 1,435 volunteers last year. That is the equivalent of 50 full-time employees. Their annual budget is \$14 million, but this includes approximately \$12 million in in-kind donations, like food. The vast majority of their funding comes from individuals and groups. They receive funding from county and city taxes, but nothing from the state or federal government.

PROJECT C.U.R.E.

Beth Rottman from Project C.U.R.E. was our quest speaker on August 20. Project C.U.R.E. is an organization that collects and ships excess medical supplies to those in overseas. They need are headquartered in Denver, but have six warehouses throughout the country, including one in Woodridge.

The supplies that Project C.U.R.E. collects are all donated. These donations come from manufacturers who have excess product or medical providers who are upgrading or no longer need certain equipment. Their warehouses are stocked with these items.

Prior to donating, a group travels to the destination to survey the needs of the country. They ensure that the supplies are needed and can be utilized. When ready, the supplies are packed into 40-foot medical containers. Each container contains \$350,000-\$500,000 worth of supplies and costs \$25,000 to ship.

The organization is run almost entirely by volunteers. Last year, 35,000 volunteers donated their time. The volunteers keep the warehouses organized by sorting items. They also help pack the shipping containers.

The organization's funding comes from individual donors and organizations/corporations. They have recently employed someone to apply for grants to secure federal funding.
