Thank you to everyone who volunteered their time this year. We will be back in April to keep the road clean!


EYEGLASS COLLECTION BOX

Luncheon Speakers

AMY GRANT

On October 1, Amy Grant, State Representative for the 42nd District covering parts of DuPage County, spoke to our club.

SCARCE

Kay McKeon from SCARCE was our guest speaker on October 8. SCARCE was founded in 1990 as an organization to help with environmental education and recycling programs. Their work covers many different projects.

Kay provided the club information about the various items that can and cannot be recycled and gave us a handy list.

SCARCE rescues books to be donated to teachers and others. They have also reinvigorated the library at the DuPage County Jail and started a literacy program. They started a program that allows inmates to record themselves reading a children's book to their child. The child can then take the recording and the book home. SCARCE has also been supplying books to police departments so that they can have them for children whose parents may have been arrested and are waiting on a relative or someone else to take custody of them.

Recently, SCARCE has been collecting bread tags. These small plastic pieces are very easily recycled. They deliver the tags to a young girl in Indiana who collects them from all over and recycles them for money to purchase wheelchairs To date, these tags for children. have allowed her to purchase seven wheelchairs.

Another new program is the Guitars for Vets program. SCARCE

provides free guitar lessons to veterans with PTSD and if the guitar playing is therapeutic and enjoyable to the veteran, they will donate a guitar. They have also worked with high school students at York High School who have begun making guitar picks out of old credit and gift cards.

Kay is always looking for ways to reuse and recycle items. She makes frequent trips to various locations around the country to drop off donated items. SCARCE is always looking for volunteers to deliver items. You can visit their office at 799 Roosevelt Rd, Building 2 in Glen Ellyn to donate items.

TABOR HILLS

Debbie Self from Tabor Hills was our guest speaker on October 15 to inform us about their Senior Day Services Program. Debbie is the program coordinator.

Debbie estimates that in 2023, there will be 43,000 Naperville residents over the age of 55. As these individuals get older, some of them will require services to allow them to stay in their homes. The major issue will be Alzheimer's which affects 1 in 10 people over the age of 65. These individuals are usually cared for by family members and those family members have a lot going on outside of this care.

Senior Day Services can help these seniors to stay at home and provide respite for their caretakers. It allows the senior to avoid social isolation and loneliness and get out and

experience life and create their own stories.

At Tabor Hills, their Senior Day Services has a comfortable, home-like atmosphere. It is a professional care setting where individuals can receive therapeutic, social, and health services for part of a day. They have different spaces for different activities. Guests are served meals that are cooked on site. Transportation is not provided and guests must be dropped off and picked up.

Tabor Hills has different pricing for half or full days and most current guests attend for half days. The capacity is 18 guests per day. Currently, they average about five guests per day and Debbie is looking to spread the word about their services in the community.

CHANGES IN MEDICARE

Nancy Conley was our guest speaker on October 29. Nancy is a SHIP (Senior Health Insurance Program) volunteer. In her roll as a volunteer, she helps people enroll and navigate Medicare and the myriad of options.

She volunteers at the Lisle Park District once per week and will meet with people who have questions or need guidance. This generally occurs with a one-on-one counseling session. She does not sell or recommend any specific type of insurance or plan. All of her services are free to use.

Nancy told the club about some changes that are coming to Medigap coverage. Some plans will soon be eliminated for new eligible recipients. She also discussed some changes to Part D coverage.

Nancy also demonstrated the new plan finder on Medicare.gov. recommended that everyone go to this site to research and find available plans. If you provide your Medicare information, you will be your able to view current prescriptions and compare available plan options. You can also change plans during open enrollment which is ongoing through December 7.

Approved the Club and Foundation regular meeting minutes of September 24, 2019.

Approved the Club and Foundation Treasurer's Report for September 30, 2019.

Approved the Social Service Report for October 2019. Discussed the implementation of co-pay requirements and purchase of OrCam equipment.

Approved the following donations and grants:

Approved the at-large membership of Kathy Lukavsky. Discussed members past due amounts.

Turkey Trot advertisements and other announcements have been provided to Naperville Town Planner and Positively Naperville Daily Calendar.

Discussed Naperville Half Marathon. It was a sunny and warm day. NNLC provided volunteers for two areas and received \$950 for volunteer support of the Marathon.

Discussed Candy Day. Friday was wet and cold but collections were strong. Total amount collected was \$6,736 to support the Foundation services. 12 Lions volunteered working approximately 83 hours.

Other volunteers worked approximately 40 hours.

Discussed Annual Summer Raffle. U.S. Bank will no longer allow us to sell raffle tickets at their location.

Discussed "Pizza Wars" fundraiser. Event will be held on February 19, 2020 at Naperville Central High School. Sponsorships are available. Event program is currently being developed.

Approved the acceptance of pillowcases to be donated to Edward Hospital. The pillowcases will replace the current stuffed toys.

Approved \$50 to purchase name tags for the pillows and the actual cost (which will be determined) of material for the pillows.

Discussed payment for volunteer work done at Lisle Eyes to the Skies Festival. No payment has been received as of this date.

Discussed the installation of the Club main eye glass collection box, which is to be located at the Community Bank in downtown Naperville. The base for the box has been completed and placement of the collection box is anticipated to be on Friday October 25, 2019.

Approved the Clubs annual Christmas lunch to be held on December 10, 2019 at Walker's Charhouse and the collection of toys for Humanitarian Service Project. Cost of the lunch will be \$10 per person.

Approved a two-year extension of the club's highway clean-up project with DuPage County.
