107th LIONS INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION

Lion Jim Woodring attended the International Convention in July. Below is his report on his experience.

The Lions International Convention was held this year in Orlando. We know it's the biggest service

organization, with operations in 200 countries, but it was impressive to see such a global gathering. Over 10,600 Lions were housed in 18 hotels and served by frequent shuttle buses on 5 routes. The buses carried banners such as "Powered by Lions kindness". Greetings and photos were exchanged, too many to list but including Mexico, India, Ireland. Nigeria, Nepal. China. Korea, and Australia. Most wore colorful and elaborate clothing representing their culture. U.S. attendees settled for just a shirt and pants with some Lions' although Texans had their big white Stetson hats. Folks were quite happy pose for anyone carrying a camera. It was refreshing to see politics set aside with the complete focus on Lionism.

The Convention is for the serious business of running а global organization with committee meetings and campaigning offices in the on-site election. I ended up waving a placard for Tony Benbow, an Australian banker running for 3rd VP. His inspiring speech was followed by 10 minutes of hoopla, including a rousing playing of "The Man Down Under". Most all Presidents Past made an appearance and there was recognition of big donors, some of multiple millions. I believe over \$84 million in donations was raised during the year.

A goal of LCI is the push for 1.5 million Lions (Mission 1.5). International Directors were charged to focus on new clubs; it was

announced that 400 new clubs were chartered during the year.

A special display reviewed the history of Helen Keller, including when she attended the 1925 Lions Convention in Cedar Point, Ohio and charged Lions to be "Knights of the Blind."

The Melvin Jones Fellowship luncheon was attended by about 700. I sat with the delegation from St. Kitts (pop 45,000). The were eager to learn more about the Plusoptix vision screener.

Display booths demonstrated projects such as a low-cost concrete cook stove with vent stack, which is economical for fuel and avoids toxic exposure to gases particulate in the smoke. Another project provides kits to assemble low-cost, wooden, hand-cranked carts for persons living paralysis. I was photographed taking one for a spin. The Cookies for Kids' Cancer project raises money to research better treatments for childhood aimed at cancers. improved effectiveness and reduced side effects. They have supported dozens of research projects at \$150,000 to \$200,000 each—with cookies!

A very popular booth used cameras and an Al program to turn images of attendees into "lions". Repeat shots gave different results.

But a major focus was just fun and a chance to informally talk with those from other countries about their experiences. The plenary sessions

were attended by thousands, with very professional graphics, music, and videos. Of course, Mickey and Minnie Mouse appeared and there was a powerful interview with recordsetting Olympian Michael Phelps on his struggles with depression and anxiety. He highly recommends the book "The Power of Now".

The Parade of Nations was very well-attended and gave countries and states a chance to show their colors.

There was a seminar on a soon-tobe-released AI system just on Lions data at LCI headquarters, which should make searching for and organizing information much easier for users. It's called Ellie.

The event was a kaleidoscope of sights and interactions. Most of us don't attend the world conventions, but if you get the chance to make a vacation of one, it will be a memorable experience. They give an idea of the effort and organization needed to coordinate Lions worldwide and generate 22,000 LCIF grants since 1968, totaling \$1.3 billion.

2026: Hong Kong; 2027: Washington, D.C.; 2028: Singapore; 2029: Minneapolis; 2030: San Antonio; and 2031: Helsinki.

Luncheon Speakers

LOAVES & FISHES

On August 5, Debbie White spoke to the club about Loaves & Fishes. Debbie is the Senior Director of Donor and Community Engagement. She thanked us for several years of support of her organization.

Loaves & Fishes began in 1984 as a food panty at St. Raphael. In 2008, they opened their first shopping market for clients to visit and shop for their own items. In 2011, they opened their current market in Naperville and opened the Aurora distribution hub in 2021. They are the largest food pantry in Illinois, serving over 10,000 people per week.

The vision is to end hunger and transform lives. They provide healthy food and promote self-sufficiency. Their food comes from a combination of donations, food rescue, and purchasing. They need to purchase many highly perishable items like eggs and milk to ensure clients can receive fresh items.

In 2016, Loaves & Fishes aligned with Naperville Cares. Naperville Cares provides many different methods of support. These include emergency rental assistance, job coaches, and connections to other organizations.

Debbie was on hand to inform the club about their new initiative to buy a large composter. They collect 8 million pounds of food annually and unfortunately, some of it has to get thrown out – to the tune of 300,000 pounds. That food waste is currently going to landfills and costing them a significant amount of money for the haul away. They are in the process of raising money to buy an on-site composter, which will help them to save money on hauling and reduce landfill use and greenhouse gas emissions. This is a large upfront cost - \$290,000. They have already raised \$190.000.

CHICAGO CRUISERS

On August 12, Lion Darryl Kirkland, Lucky McKeown, and Caroline Foote spoke with our club about the Chicago Cruisers and their Ride for Kids.

The Chicago Cruisers are a motorcycle club made up of riders who enjoy riding and raising money for charities. They meet once per month and take rides throughout the area. Some rides last a few hours and some last a few days. Each ride has a ride captain who is responsible for the route, the accommodations, and leading the ride.

The group is made up of about 30 members, but they allow guests to ride as well. There are all types of motorcycles and three-wheelers that are used and the only requirement is that it can maintain highway speeds.

The group supports many charities, but their primary focus is the Ride for Kids, which benefits the Pediatric Brain Tumor Foundation. They charge an entrance fee for the ride and sell extra items at the event to raise additional money.

The Pediatric Tumor Brain Foundation provides money for research and to individual families and hospitals. They also provide online support groups and resources for families dealing with pediatric brain tumors. Lucky advised us that with the current federal cuts to cancer research, the foundation relies on the Ride for Kids even more.

DIVEHEART

Jim Elliott returned to the club on August 19 to speak about his organization, Diveheart. Diveheart is an organization that provides scuba diving services for people with disabilities. Individuals experience weightlessness and freedom while diving that they cannot experience in their everyday lives.

Jim provided the club with an update on the organization's project to build one of the deepest, if not the deepest, pools in the world. They have secured many patents and their design would be 130 feet deep with enough room for 300 people. Currently, the holdup for completion is funding. They are hopeful that the money can be raised so that it gets built in Illinois.

Jim showed the group a video of a Diveheart diver who had lost the ability to walk. Through the program, she felt empowered and like her old self.

The group takes trips to Cozumel for dive trips. These trips are an opportunity for participants to dive and for training for other instructors so that they can return to their home area and continue the program.
