Marita Manning from the Naperville Police Department spoke to the Lions group about various senior programs to keep senor citizens safe and sound.

In the fall of 2000 a patrol sergeant recognized that police officers on his shift frequently encountered lost or "wandering"

seniors who because of dementia or other illness, had walked away from home, unable to remember their name, address or family member information. With the help of a police captain, they began formulating a plan for Naperville's "Elderly Services Team." A call for volunteers brought out personnel from all Divisions and Units, including Crime Prevention, Investigations, Animal Control, Patrol, Communications, and Social Services. The first meeting was held at the police department and team members quickly realized that many other City employees and service providers encounter similar situations when attempting to assist senior citizens. The Elderly Services Team became a citywide effort.

The Elderly Services Team now consists of members from all City departments as well as the local TRIAD, senior service agencies, health professionals, and virtually anyone who can assist in our mission to service senior citizens. At monthly meetings, the team discusses areas of concern and works to implement strategies that will provide long-term solutions when an issue is identified. Members use their expertise to educate each other informally, discussing such on-goings cases as plumbing scams, elder abuse, financial exploitation, and the use of code enforcement to assist seniors living in unsafe conditions.

Mission Statement

It is the goal and objective of the City of Naperville to formulate a citywide team of professionals dedicated to serving the elderly population in our community. The City recognizes the ongoing demographic shift toward an older population and the need to provide a community oriented approach to protect and maintain the quality of life for this segment of our society. With this in mind, the Elderly Services Team will be dedicated to working in concert with each other and the senior population in an effort

to provide greater security, dignity, and independence for those persons who have reached the autumn of their lives.

Programs

The Elderly Services Team has developed several formal programs to assist seniors and their families living in Naperville:

- Senior Living Facility Liaisons
- Senior Photo ID Database
- <u>Senior Buddy Program</u>
- 911 Guardian
- <u>Cell Phones for Seniors</u>

Through cooperation from various City departments, the EST has been successful in thwarting several home repair frauds in progress and rescued an elderly woman from deplorable living conditions and a neglectful caregiver. The team has also developed a PowerPoint program that any member can utilize to give a presentation to a nursing home or community group, and recently provided citywide training to all Naperville employees about the team and its mission.
